They increased in numbers in the early 18th century targeting stagecoaches, carriages and mail coaches. They were usually armed with pistols and are famous for the phrase 'stand and deliver.' It was widely held that they did not rob from the poor. The most famous highwayman in Dick Turpin.</p>
